
Location: Camp Buckner, Burnet


9. Are you an early bird or a night owl?

11. What is the most fun part of your job?



Why put together a recordbook?

- · Recordbooks allow the members to tell how they have grown, what they have learned, where they came up short, and to do it creatively within outlined paremters
- Recordbooks demonstrate the importance of keeping a written document of what has been done
- · Recordbooks provide a written platform for goal setting and documentation of the actions required to reach goals

Parts of a Recordbook

- Check Sheet
- Personal Information Page
- 4-H Story & Photo Portfolio
- Report Forms



Record-keeping process

- Goal setting-getting started · Set goals to help you grow through
- your 4-H project Journaling-As things happen
 - Keep records of everything that happens with your project (calendars, index boxes, binders, or apps are great tools)
 - Reflecting-looking back
 - Reflecting on your progress helps you prepare to complete your recordbook
