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## Kick that 1st Meeting off with Fun!

Starting your new 4-H year on the right foot is crucial for ensuring a great, successful year with your club. Here are a few tips to help you kick off in style!

#### 1. Ice Breaker Activities:

- a. There are a plethora of resources out there with "get to know you" activities and Ice Breaker ideas. Here are a few of my favorites:
  - i.4-H Meeting BINGO! (download this template on the 4-H Club Manager Page on the D8 website)
  - ii. In Common (directions on the D8 Website)
  - iii. Find your match (this can be done as animals, as food, as people, etc. You make matches/groups based on what category you use, write those on index cards or post it notes. Each person receives a card. They will proceed to find their matches. Once in their pair/group, have them get to know each other. How long have they been 4-H? What are they interested in? etc.)
- 2. 4-H Overview
  - a. Give an overview of what families can expect for the year. What do your officers have planned? Where are you headed? How can they get involved? (Pro tip: give them a handout with the same information)
- 3. Set Goals
  - a. Provide goal-setting worksheets where members can outline their personal objectives like "Learn to care for a calf," or "Win a blue ribbon in photography." After filling out the worksheets, have members share one goal with the group.
- 4. Introduce Officers and Club Leaders
  - a. Hold off on asking new members to introduce themselves. This can be daunting and overwhelming. Instead, introduce those running the club and have them tell a little bit about what they do.
  - b. If you would like for everyone to learn each other's names, give everyone name badges.
- 5. Snacks and Games
  - a. End the meeting with a fun snack, craft, or recreation. This is a great way to ensure that your club left a fun mark on those in attendance, encouraging them to come back for month 2.
  - b. Games where everyone gets to play are a great time filler, and allow the students to have an activity while the adults get their questions answered.

Doing these things will go a long way in helping your club get off on the right foot and ensure that your members have a great first meeting. Remember, this meeting sets the tone for the entire year. If we get off on a boring and bland foot, you can expect the same for the entirety of the year.



### **Record Book-Goal Setting**

As we begin a new 4-H year, setting clear goals is crucial for a successful experience. Whether members are new or returning, establishing personal and project goals helps them stay focused and motivated throughout the year. One of the best tools for tracking progress and reflecting on achievements is the 4-H Record Book. This important document not only helps members organize their activities but also builds valuable life skills such as planning, time management, and self-reflection.


Setting Goals: Encourage members to start by setting specific, achievable goals for the year. These could range from mastering a new skill, like learning to sew or training an animal, to broader goals such as developing leadership qualities or completing a community service project. Writing down these goals in the record book provides a roadmap for the year and helps members stay on track.

Getting Started with Record Books:

1. Begin Early:

- Encourage members to start their record books at the beginning of the year. This allows them to document their progress regularly, making it easier to capture details and milestones.
- 2. Break It Down:
  - Teach members to break down their goals into smaller, manageable steps. For example, if a member's goal is to show a lamb at the county fair, they can list tasks such as selecting the animal, learning feeding routines, and practicing showmanship.
- 3. Use Resources:
  - Provide members with guides and templates from the Texas 4-H website to help them organize their record books. Hosting a record book workshop early in the year can also give members the confidence to get started.
- 4. Reflect and Adjust:
  - Encourage members to regularly review their record books, updating them with new experiences and reflecting on their progress. This not only helps with goal achievement but also prepares them for end-ofyear evaluations.

Setting goals and maintaining an organized record book, members not only document their 4-H journey but also gain a sense of accomplishment as they see their growth over the year. These habits lay the foundation for success in 4-H and beyond.
